Planning for the future of Merri-bek

After the election of a new council, every Victorian council is required to refresh their Community Vision and develop a new four-year Council Plan. This process is guided by the Local Government Act 2020.

What is the Council Plan?

The Council Plan sets the overarching goals and objectives that Council aims to achieve during its term. This includes long-term aspirations related to the community's development, environmental sustainability, economic growth and public wellbeing. When developing the Council Plan, newly elected Councillors are guided by the Community Vision and public priorities. The plan will reference our refreshed Community Vision and how the people of Merri-bek see the future of the municipality.

Where are we now in this process?

To refresh our Community Vision and assist Councillors with development of the Council Plan, we assembled a Community Panel and a Youth Panel. The Youth Panel invites young people to actively participate in local decision-making and promotes intergenerational dialogue. In February, both groups spent three days deliberating on what is important for Merri-bek's future. The Community Panel was formed from 44 Merri-bek residents randomly selected from over 950 applications and representing the demographic diversity of our municipality. Young voices were represented by 24 people of diverse backgrounds and cultures.

The work of these two panels laid the foundation for our Councillors to formulate community priorities and strategic objectives for Merri-bek's Council Plan 2025-2029.

What happens next?

Once the strategic documents are endorsed, Council will exhibit the draft 10-year Community Vision, long-term Asset Plan, long-term Financial Plan and four-year Council Plan (incorporating the Municipal Health and Wellbeing Plan) for public viewing and community feedback for a minimum of 20 business days. We expect this broader community engagement to happen throughout July and August 2025.

"There's a real sense of community"

Our new Fawkner Leisure Centre is now open! Following a \$36.8 million redevelopment, the state-of-the-art centre offers accessible, sustainable facilities for everyone. Recently, we caught up with local resident and longtime member, Anthony Manovella to see what he thinks of the new space.

How long have you been a member at Fawkner Leisure Centre?

For over 40 years now! One of my earliest memories is actually coming here for swimming lessons. In prep, we used to walk hand-in-hand from school — very cute looking back. Mum was also a yoga teacher here, so there's a big family connection too.

What do you love about the new Fawkner Leisure Centre?

I look out at the pool and remember meeting my school friends, hanging out under the trees, the gym; there's a bit of nostalgia.

But the facilities now are so, so much better! It's way more accessible, there's lots of shade outside to protect people from the sun. The gym is fantastic and full of new equipment.

I've also been here so long that I know a lot of people; there's a real sense of community. On reopening day, I saw about half a dozen people who were members before [the centre closed for redevelopment]. It's so nice to catch up.

I also love that there's a wide demographic of people who come here. Older people, younger people, people from all backgrounds; there's something for everyone and it feels very inclusive.

What facilities do you use at the centre and what do you like about them?

I primarily use the gym but a couple of days a week I'll also use the pool and swim laps. Physically it makes me feel great. I'm retired, but previous to that I had a pretty highstress job. I actually used to come here on my lunch breaks to swim some laps. It was a wonderful way to de-stress.

Aged care reforms

The New Aged Care Act will start on July 1 2025, bringing a range of improvements for older people, including easier entry and access to services. For those using the Commonwealth Home Support Program services, there will be no changes until after July 1 2027. The Support at Home program will replace current packages from July next year. Your package provider will offer more information on this transition. For new service assessments, contact My Aged Care at **© 1800 200 422**. We love our parks, playgrounds and sports grounds

Here's what's been happening in our community's green and open spaces.

Sunny Days

While playing sport or having a picnic this season, remember to stay cool with these tips:

Stay hydrated: Drink plenty of water throughout the day. Carry a reusable bottle with you.

Stay cool: Visit the park or the pitch in the morning or evening - avoid outdoor activities during the hottest part of the day (10 AM - 3 PM). Keep blinds closed and stay in air-conditioned spaces if possible.

Never leave anyone in a car or hot place: Cars heat up fast - never leave adults, kids, or pets unattended.

Dress for the weather: Wear light, loose-fitting clothes, a hat, and sunscreen.

Check on vulnerable people: Look out for elderly neighbours, friends, and those most at risk.

Stay informed: Download the VicEmergency app or tune in to AM radio for updates.

Care for animals: Make sure pets stay in a cool place with adequate water and consider putting out some water for wildlife.

This March, construction will begin on the Raeburn Cricket Net Upgrade. The cricket nets at the reserve were built in 1979 with minor upgrades since. They are now at the end of their lifecycle and becoming unsafe for users. In May 2024, the State Government announced funding of \$175,000 towards the upgrade of the nets, and the club saw a successful Council Community Budget bid of \$100,000 to go towards the project and have also received a Cricket Victoria grant of \$40,000.

The Cricket Club host 15 teams at Raeburn Reserve consisting of both male and female teams. As we upgrade the nets, we will be embracing environmentally friendly practices. To find out more, visit **© conversations.merribek.vic.gov.au/raeburn-cricket-net-upgrade**



Updates on York Street

Our A Park Close to Home plan aims to ensure the Merri-bek community live within 500 metres walking distance to a park or open space, and within 300 metres for those living in our busiest areas. As part of this plan, we purchased the property at the corner of York and Westgate streets in Pascoe Vale South, to turn it into a public open space.

At the beginning of 2024 we asked the community, 'What type of park would you like this to be?' and heard from 346 people – thank you, Merri-bek residents! Your feedback informed the development of the final design, featuring a sheltered play area, picnic tables, drinking fountains and more.

Works in your area



Balam Balam Place. Brunswick The \$30 million redevelopment of 15 Phoenix Street is complete! There are dedicated spaces for maternal and child health services, multi-purpose community rooms, commercial office spaces and an improved connection to the Brunswick Baths. The name Balam Balam means butterfly in Woi-wurrung and symbolises beauty, transformation, creativity, and the strength of community. Registrations are now open for creatives and community groups interested in using the space to meet and gather.



Wheatsheaf Road, Glenroy

Wheatsheaf Road is an important link to Glenroy Station, recently upgraded as part of the Level Crossing Removal works. We're improving the section between **Glenroy Road and Plumpton** Avenue. The upgrades, like footpath reconstruction, will improve the presentation of Wheatsheaf Road, and make it easier and safer to visit.



Dawson St bike lanes, Brunswick Designs for the Dawson Street bike lanes are set for installation over the April school holiday period. New concrete separators will replace the temporary, rubber infrastructure, along with road resurfacing and fresh linemarking to create a safe and easy-to-use bike connection for riders of all skill levels to enjoy. These lanes were originally installed as a 12-month trial and endorsed for permanent installation based on community feedback.



CB Smith Reserve, Fawkner CB Smith Reserve on Jukes Road is home to Fawkner Library and other council services that make up Fawkner Community Hub. New works, including a car park upgrade to improve accessibility and pedestrian safety, additional lighting and pathway improvements make the precinct a safer and more engaging space for the community. The playground area has also been made more accessible for children.



Sewell Reserve, Glenroy

We heard that you want fenced dog parks in Glenroy! The new Sewell Reserve fenced dog park is a perfect spot for smaller or more relaxed pups. You'll find it between the sports pavilion and the netball courts on Glenrov Road. Included in the upgrade is a bunch of natural shade, many seating options, a variety of terrain for dogs to navigate, double-gated access points at each end of the park and a drinking fountain with a dog bowl.



HW Foletta Park, Brunswick HW Foletta Park is an area in Brunswick that is enjoyed by many – and it was time for an upgrade! We received your thoughts and suggestions about what changes you wanted to the playground in the small park, including the addition of monkey bars, roofed playing areas and a variety of sitting options.


