ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS AND OTHER MATTERS

Cr Politis

- Attended a Merri-bek Business networking event in Coburg North, held in a renovated warehouse now operating as a dance studio. The event brought together a diverse range of local businesses, including long-established operators, artists and creative industries such as glass blowing. Cr Politis noted the area employs more than 3,500 people and continues to grow, and congratulated the Economic Development Unit for creating opportunities for local businesses to connect, collaborate and support local jobs.
- Acknowledged Aged Care Employee Day on 7 August, noting Merri-bek is one of only 30% of councils continuing to provide aged care services that support older residents to remain at home and live in their community with dignity and independence. Cr Politis also acknowledged Alex, a Merri-bek Community Transport driver.

Cr Yildiz

- Expressed his condolences on the passing of Cr Politis's mother, Stamata Politis.
- Acknowledged the passing of Patricia Ilhan and the incredible work she has done for so many different foundations.

Cr Miles

- Congratulated Hadfield Football Club on reaching finals for the first time in 11 years and noted he would attend their final home-and-away game on Saturday.

Cr Bolton

- Attended the opening of the new clubrooms at Shore Reserve, noting the long-term advocacy and perseverance of the club over many years. Cr Bolton acknowledged the club's 100-year history and its welcoming role in the community, including for diverse families, neurodiverse people and queer parents, highlighting the broader community role of local sporting clubs.
- Attended the third anniversary rally for the Sydney Road Accessible Tram Stops campaign, noting the campaign's increasing urgency as the Upfield line closure for level crossing removal approaches and acknowledging growing political interest in the need for accessible tram stops.
- Acknowledged an attack on a Muslim woman at Glenroy Coles in mid-July, noting the real-world impacts of racist commentary and that the incident contributed to the organisation of a Unite Against Racism rally in Broadmeadows on 25 July.

Report 7.1 Don Bosco Hostel and Youth Centre Brunswick - Advocacy

Council received 2 statements and 1 question. They were presented to Council:

Statement 1

Mark Everhuis made the following statement:

We are meeting today on the Wurundjeri land of the Kulin Nation where Aboriginal children and young people have played for tens of thousands of years. I want to pay my respects to elders past and present and to pay those same respects to any Aboriginal people here today or online.

My name is Mark Evenhuis. I live in Coburg. My two boys have grown up jumping on the trampolines and patting the rabbits at Don Bosco.

I'm one of many fighting to keep Don Bosco part of our community.

My friends with me today will speak to what Don Bosco means to us and what it could become. But I want to use my statement to first clarify what our community is asking for.

The Salesians say selling was a difficult decision, made after reviewing their local services and intended to meet their financial obligations to survivors of historic abuse.

The Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse found that about one in five members of the Salesian order had child sexual abuse claims against them between 1950 and 2010, totalling over 100 reported claims.

However, the Salesians' financial reporting shows the order has hundreds of millions of dollars in assets and investments - more than enough to meet these claims many times over.

We've recently written to the Salesians asking them to instead sell off assets that would have less impact on children and young people's wellbeing.

But we are not holding our breath that they will change their minds. So we need Council to be on the front foot in finding an alternative pathway to keep the centre part of our community.

We are also reluctant to mount a campaign to stop the sale. We don't want to stand between survivors of horrendous abuse and the compensation they rightfully deserve.

We also understand that Council finances will not extend to purchasing the property.

So what are we asking for? We are asking for the Council to urgently explore all reasonable options to keep this precious asset in our community – options beyond those outlined in the Council's report.

We think these options should include council urgently approaching the State Government, to build high density housing, with provision for a youth centre to be leased on a peppercorn rent to the right organisation.

We think a similar result could be achieved through bringing in a registered Community Housing Provider via the Development Facilitation Program.

The Council could also consider offering a future developer additional building height in exchange for a s173 agreement which gifts the youth centre to the community

These options are fleshed out in more detail in the pro bono brief prepared by Emmett Sati attached to this statement.

All we're asking for is that Council fight for Don Bosco's future as hard as this community loves the place. But the clock is ticking. The Salesians' EOI closes in a week. Thank you.

Statement 2

Claire Marshall, made the following statement:

My name is Claire Marshall. I live in Coburg with my partner and primary age children on unceded Wurundjeri land.

My community members and friends in the room have spoken about the value of Don Bosco to our community and how it is a safe and important place for families to gather.

Don Bosco also provides an increasingly rare service in our community - a place for vulnerable families and children to gather, at no cost.

Council members understand that there are multiple intersecting factors that are increasing disadvantage, poverty, poor mental health and poor outcomes for children, young people and families across Merri-bek.

We know that without third places - a place that isn't home or school that is a safe and accessible place to meet, socialise and form community - poor social outcomes and marginalisation increase.

We also know on the research and the data that these factors present together - intersectional disadvantage and a lack of safe, community-based places to go - we see increases in school disengagement, youth engagement in the justice system, and violence in the home and the community.

This is a collective responsibility of our community. It is not the individual fault of these children and young people. If we withdraw the services and safe places that these members of our community come to, we as a community - and Council as our representatives - have contributed to the troubling outcomes we know come next.

We have an opportunity to protect a space that contributes to better outcomes with the vulnerable and disadvantaged people who are also deeply valued members of our community. A space that provides hostel and a safe place to sleep for young people with nowhere else to go. A third place for people who can't afford anything else in our community. Protecting Don Bosco will also protect countless members of Merri-Bek - delivering on Council's own vision for Merri-Bek to lead, and leave no-one behind.

Question

Lee Cath asked if Council will commit to working actively with community members, along with State and Federal Governments, to find a solution which retains the Don Bosco Centre for community use, including writing to the Salesians to ask for an extension to the EOI period on the sale of the property?

At the request of the Mayor, Director Community, Eamonn Fennessy responded:

Thank you, Lee, for your question, and to acknowledge the great love for Don Bosco that is in the room. Many of us in the room have experienced the Centre as children, as parents, possibly as grandparents and it is a terrific and valued place.

Council will consider a report this evening on the Don Bosco Centre, and how best to advocate for Don Bosco. A key recommendation of the report is to advocate to both levels of government to see what support can be put in place to continue the service that is offered at Don Bosco.

Report 7.6 Open Council Resolutions Report

Council received 2 questions. They were presented to Council:

Andrea Bunting asked if Council has made any representations to the State Government to request that in the new contracts the train operator be penalised for short-shunting trains at Batman Station?

Andrea Bunting asked if Council will use its survey on bus services to collect data about whether residents will be more attracted to using the Upfield train line if the bus service frequency improved?

At the request of the Mayor, Director Place and Environment, Pene Winslade responded:

Council's established advocacy has long focused on improving reliability, frequency and capacity on the Upfield Line, particularly through duplication of the single-track section between Gowrie and Upfield alongside other network improvements such as removing the remaining level crossings.

The State's re-franchising process is a matter for the Victorian Government, and Council has not adopted a specific position regarding contractual penalties within that procurement. However, as Council develops its broader transport advocacy priorities, Council can consider whether there are opportunities to advocate for measures that improve reliability, noting that primary advocacy focus remains around the infrastructure investment that unlocks everything else.

In relation to the second question, the updated Council Resolution Action Memo this month indicates that the survey work will be developed shortly alongside work on the Transport Advocacy Strategy. The original resolution did not specifically include alternative modes of transport but Council can consider your feedback around bus connections and other relevant factors when we design that survey.

Notice of Motion 8.1 Data Centres

Council received 3 statements and 1 question. The question was taken on notice. The following statements were presented to Council:

Statement 1

Sarah Webber made the following statement:

I call on the Council to support a moratorium on data centres (DC) development and support stronger planning frameworks to prevent harms to communities and the environment.

I am a Merri-bek resident, and a technology researcher at the University of Melbourne. I have a background in IT infrastructure project management. I am also a board member at Merri-bek Tech, a local group of volunteers. Like many IT professionals, we are deeply concerned about fast tracking DCs, and increasing dependence on extractive tech corporations, many of which disregard humane values, democracy and environmental impacts.

Impacts and Risks

Australia is targeted for DC developments as communities across the USA and Europe protest the negative impacts of these facilities. DCs contribute to industrialisation of suburbs, and occupy land that might have been used for housing or parks. They are polluting and noisy, cause power price increases and outages, and consume scarce water - and they don't deliver the jobs promised.

Societal benefits from large DCs will be negligible

Hyperscale DCs are being built primarily to expand Generative AI, because products such as ChatGPT and Claude are attracting enormous speculative investment, even though there is scant evidence of social benefits. The mode of "productivity" GenAI offers involves fewer jobs, and less meaningful work.

These DCs use imported technology and provide few jobs after construction; for example, a 20ha DC planned for Truganina will employ just 48 staff and 12 off-peak staff.

AI DCs will delay climate change milestones

DC companies are notoriously secretive about energy and water consumption. But large AI DCs involve energy density and fluctuations that cannot be met with present-day renewables and batteries, so despite any renewable energy they fund for others to use, overall they will delay net zero milestones. For stable supply they require generators and diesel stored onsite, creating air pollution and enormous fire risk.

These negative impacts and risks are unacceptable, given the lack of community benefits.

Recommendations

We call on the Council to support calls for a moratorium on data centre development, taking seriously public opposition, and widespread concern amongst academics and IT professionals.

We advocate for:

- smaller data centres that can be powered through renewable energy, without offsets.
- digital infrastructure that is democratically planned to meet community priorities, and locally owned to build local technology expertise and capabilities.

At a minimum, Council must call on State and Federal Governments to:

- pause DC developments, and
- establish planning frameworks, enforceable standards and legislation to protect communities and the environment from harm.

Statement 2

Maggie Cowling, on behalf of Climate Action Merri-bek made the following statement:

Climate Action Merri-bek supports Cr Sue Bolton's notice of motion 8.1.

While there are currently no AI data centre proposals for Merri-bek, we should nonetheless be prepared by establishing our minimum expectations and planning requirements. We should also stand in solidarity with communities to our north and west who are yet again the target of Melbourne's most polluting new projects.

Rather than repeat Cr Bolton's list of negative impacts from data centres, we would like to raise the following questions:

What impact will hyperscale AI data centres have on our energy transition, which Merri-bek is working so hard towards? Will they negate the advances we've made in renewables, destabilise the grid and push out the retirement of our fossil fuel power stations?

What impact will they have on our urban heat island problem, which we have also worked hard to mitigate?

How will they benefit local community climate resilience and adaptation?

What would well-crafted planning regulations look like that protect community from all the negative impacts of data centres?

On Monday night, Hume City Council, which already has several data centres, with a new proposal for a hyperscale data centre on Barry Rd close to homes, child care centre etc, passed a motion to write to state government ministers and the premier calling for a moratorium.

But on Tuesday, State Parliament blocked a bill to introduce a moratorium on new hyperscale AI data centres.

Merri-bek Council needs to know where it stands and we urge Council not only to support Cr. Bolton's motion, but to call for a moratorium while regulations, planning frameworks and standards are tailored.

Report 7.2 Tate Reserve – Conflict Resolution Outcome

Council received 1 question. It was presented to Council:

Viktoria Christopouolos asked how will the planned measures act as a sufficient solution to the issue, and what are the benefits of having a no-dog area at Tate Reserve?

At the request of the Mayor, Director City Infrastructure, Greg Rodwell responded:

Thank you for the question, Viktoria. Open spaces are important finite resources and are required to meet a multitude of needs. The recommended measures work together to reduce conflict by creating a clearer, safer and more legible spaces within Tate Reserve. Wider and improved paths provide greater capacity for pedestrians, runners, cyclists and dog walkers to share those spaces safely. Signage help users understand where different activities are permitted and promotes compliance with park rules. Fencing provides a clear, physical distinction between dog access areas and sensitive environment areas. Combined with the ongoing education and engagement that Council officers have been doing through the Tate Reserve Working Group, these measures are intended to improve safety, reduce conflict and protect environmental values and support respectful shared use of the reserve.

In terms of the second question, the no dog area at Tate Reserve provides an important environmental, safety and community benefit. It helps protect the sensitive creek-side habitat biodiversity and wildlife area from disturbance while supporting the revegetation and erosion management works that have been going on in that space for a few years. The area also creates a space for community members who feel uncomfortable around dogs and supports activities that benefit from a dog-free environment by providing a clear, defined area where the dogs are not permitted alongside areas where the dogs are able to remain accessible so the reserve can better accommodate the wider range of park users.

NON-AGENDA ITEMS - QUESTIONS

Central Coburg Car Parking

Rachel Esposito asked Council to clarify how many of the 900 public parking spaces identified in the revised Central Coburg Framework will be located in Lousia Street precinct, whether they will continue to operate as free 3-hour parking 7 days a week and whether Council has considered increasing public parking capacity by adding additional levels to the existing multi-level car parks?

At the request of the Mayor, Director Place and Environment, Pene Winslade responded:

Thank you, Rachel. The Central Coburg Framework is a long-term vision, it is a long-term, high level plan, not a fine grain, detailed plan. The projects are to be developed and delivered over the next 10 to 15 years. On Louisa Street, the Framework includes a new five-storey multi-deck car park with around 200 spaces. Additional stories would be difficult due to technical constraints. The final design and the detail for how the parking will be managed, that will be worked out later on considering all of the different users and needs in the area.

Rachel Esposito asked, given the proposed reduction in Council-managed public parking spaces from approximately 1,600 to 900, has Council assessed the potential impacts of reduced parking accessibility on diversity and inclusion, Central Coburg's economic activity, identity and vibrancy, and what specific measures will Council implement to ensure that older people, young families, people with disabilities and their carers continue to have equitable and reliable access to public parking, without limited spaces being routinely occupied by long-term parkers, local residents or tenants?

At the request of the Mayor, Director Place and Environment, Pene Winslade responded:

Thank you, Rachel. The current carparking level is around 1100 Council carparks, not 1600, so it is about an 80% reprovision that is proposed. Noting there is other, private car parking in the vicinity as well that is not within the scope of Council's consideration. We know parking is important for many visitors and businesses, particularly those who may have difficulty accessing Central Coburg using other means. The Framework retains around 80% of public parking reprovisioned across Council-owned sites and distributes it across the precinct, not concentrated in one area but in different locations. Future parking design will consider different needs, including accessible parking, short-term stays and longer-term parking, looking at different needs from different individuals and from different user groups, business and the cultural precinct.

Target canopy for urban Australia

Michele McKay asked how Council plans to adopt the proposed planning guideline of a 3:30:300 target for tree canopy in urban areas?

At the request of the Mayor, Director City Infrastructure, Greg Rodwell responded:

Thank you for the question. It is always great to hear about emerging thinking around urban greening. The 3:30:300 principle is an interesting approach and, while it is not an adopted Council principle, its goals are broadly consistent with many of Council's existing objectives for tree canopy and urban greening.

Merri-bek's Urban Forest Strategy sets a target to double canopy cover on Council land by 2030, and an aspirational target of 29% canopy cover across the municipality by 2050. Council has also committed to planting 10,000 new trees as part of the current 4-year Council Plan. This planting program is focused on establishing larger, longer-lived canopy trees, particularly in areas with low shade and higher urban heat, so that tree planting delivers the greatest benefits to the communities and places that need them most.

The Victorian Government has also introduced a 30% tree canopy target for urban areas through the Planning Policy Framework and progressed planning reforms to strengthen the retention and provision of canopy trees, including requirements relating to retaining existing trees, providing new canopy and suitable deep soil areas to support tree growth.

Merri-bek is proactively seeking to increase the amount of open space across the municipality through its Park Close to Home program. The program see Council uses open space contributions from developers used to purchase land which is turned into public open space; with the aim of ensuring that most households have access to open space within 500 metres, or 300 metres if they are within an activity centre. This allows for greater permeability in the urban landscape and increased planting opportunities to increase canopy cover.

As housing density increases through the Central Coburg Framework and the Victorian Government's Activity Centres Program, Council will continue to look for opportunities to increase canopy and greening in our streets and public spaces, as well as through private development.

Coburg Night Market

Siobhan McCuskey asked why Council would weaken the Coburg Night Market given such strong community support?

At the request of the Mayor, Director Community, Eamonn Fennessy responded:

Thank you for your question and insight into Coburg Night Market. I have passed them on to our festivals team. Council considered a refreshed and changed festivals program a couple of months ago. Council resolved to do a lot more community engagement. That has been occurring over past couple of months and closed in early August. We are currently collating what that means for us and what people have said. It is rich and varied at first glance. When Council has a clear understanding of what the feedback is telling us and what that means for our significant festivals program, significant in scale and significant in that most of it happens between late November and March, we will bring that back to Council for consideration and a decision. That will happen before the end of this year, 2026, giving us a clearer way forward with what happens with Coburg Night Market and all the other great festivals and events we run here at Merri-bek.

Fawkner Outdoor Pool usage data

Maddy Lemmo asked when the Fawkner Outdoor Pool was last opened from October to April, and is there recent data on usage?

At the request of the Mayor, Director Community, Eamonn Fennessy responded:

Thanks Maddy. Congratulations on the Fins Swimming Club forming. The Fawkner Leisure Centre includes a year-round indoor heated 25 metre pool and a seasonal outdoor 50 metre pool, with the standard operating season running from 1 December to 31 March each year.

Data is variable. On occasion, the season has been extended or adjusted, including opening in November during periods of forecast warm weather or remaining open into April where seasonal conditions and calendar events have aligned.

Outdoor pool attendance is highly influenced by weather conditions and seasonal temperature patterns. Historically, patronage increases gradually through December as temperatures rise, generally peaks during the school holiday period, and then declines from February into March as the weather becomes milder, schools return, and community members resume regular work, school and sporting commitments.

Council recognises that pool attendance can vary depending on factors such as weather, opening hours and community awareness. As a result, usage data needs to be considered alongside other factors when assessing the operation of the pool.

Officers are currently preparing a further report will be presented to Council in September in response to a Councillor Notice of Motion, providing an opportunity to consider the Fawkner Outdoor Pool in the wider context of Council's aquatic and leisure network across the municipality, including usage, service provision and community need.

Christin Zylberberg asked, given the replacement buses in Blair Street and the temporary bus stop close to Merri-bek Primary School, how will Council ensure the safety of school children walking and riding to school.

At the request of the Mayor, Director Place and Environment, Pene Winslade responded:

Thank you very much for your question. I don't have a full answer for the question. The Yarra Trams Depot upgrade is a Yarra Trams and DTP State Government project so I am not across specific changes in this location at the moment but the network is run by the State and Council can engage with the State to try and find out more . The team can come back to you to go through some of those more detailed questions that weren't written down to get them all and see what we can do to advocate with the State Government for you.

COUNCIL REPORTS

7.1 DON BOSCO HOSTEL AND YOUTH CENTRE BRUNSWICK - ADVOCACY

Executive Summary

The Don Bosco Hostel and Youth Centre in Brunswick has been a valued place for children, young people and families since 1939.

The Don Bosco Hostel and Youth Centre is wholly owned and operated by the Catholic Church's Salesian Society (Salesians), and delivers programs and activities from its Sydney Road, Brunswick site. These include a 30-room hostel for young men aged 18 to 24, and a popular Youth Centre operating after school, on weekends and during school holidays. Activities include in-ground trampolines, table tennis, pool tables, a swimming pool and basketball courts. Don Bosco Hostel and Youth Centre is also a well-known and affordable venue for children's birthday parties.

The Salesian Society has recently determined that the Don Bosco Hostel and Youth Centre is underutilised and surplus to its requirements. The 2,871 square metre site is being offered for sale through an Expression of Interest process closing on 20 August 2026. The proposed sale and potential closure has generated significant community concern about the loss of valued services and programs. Community members have requested, through a petition with more than 5,500 signatures, that Council and the Victorian Government urgently work together to "keep the centre open and in community hands".

This report considers whether Council should purchase and operate the Don Bosco Hostel and Youth Centre and concludes this is not recommended, given the significant and unbudgeted acquisition, renewal and operating costs, the absence of a current policy direction, and Council's existing obligations and required investment in community infrastructure, programs and services in Brunswick and across Merri-bek.

The report recommends that Council write to the Salesians of Don Bosco requesting they reconsider the proposed sale and explore options to continue operating the facility. It also recommends writing to relevant State and Federal Government Ministers encouraging them to engage with the Salesians about grant and funding opportunities that could support continued programs for children and young people from the Don Bosco Hostel and Youth Centre in Brunswick.

Officer Recommendation

That Council:

1. Acknowledges the Salesians of Don Bosco Hostel and Youth Centre's role as a valued place providing activities and programs for children and young people over many years.
2. Notes the significant community interest in the Salesians of Don Bosco religious order's proposed sale of the Don Bosco Hostel and Youth Centre in Brunswick.
3. Writes to the Salesians of Don Bosco requesting that they reconsider the proposed sale of the Don Bosco Hostel and Youth Centre in Brunswick and explore options to continue operating the facility in its current location.
4. Writes to the relevant State and Federal Government Ministers encouraging them to engage with the Salesians of Don Bosco about grant opportunities and funding programs that could support the continued delivery of programs for children and young people from the Don Bosco Hostel and Youth Centre in Brunswick.

3. Acknowledges that having free space for children, young people and families is more important than ever with the increasing cost of living.
4. Notes the significant community concern about the Salesians of Don Bosco religious order's proposed sale of the Don Bosco Hostel and Youth Centre in Brunswick.
5. Notes that the Salesians of Don Bosco have stated they are seeking to sell the site to fund compensation for victim survivors of child abuse.
6. Writes to the Salesians of Don Bosco requesting that they extend the Expression of Interest period to allow for evaluation of alternative solutions to ensure the site continues as a youth space whilst also funding victim compensation, like selling off other church assets that would have less impact on children and young people's wellbeing, working with State and Federal governments to secure the future of the site, or making a condition of the sale retaining the site's current role of hosting a free space for children, young people and families.
7. Writes to relevant State and Federal Government Ministers and local State and Federal MPs requesting that they engage with the Salesians of Don Bosco around this issue to help ensure that this site can continue to host a free space for children, young people and families. This could include employing the expertise of Development Victoria to identify opportunities for the continued presence of a free youth centre at the site.
8. Backs community efforts to save a free space for children, young people and families at this site through providing in-kind support for community-driven campaign activities, up to the value of \$5000.

7.2 TATE RESERVE - CONFLICT RESOLUTION OUTCOME

Executive Summary

This report outlines the results arising from the Tate Reserve conflict resolution process. The process has resulted in proposed changes to the permanent interventions for Tate Reserve compared with what was trialled during Stage 1 of the Dog Walking Merri-bek project. The changes represent a compromise outcome which aims to address the needs of key stakeholders in a fair and balanced manner.

The changes, when compared to the trial interventions, include increasing the dog on leash area to the western side of the reserve, realigning of the fencing and installing additional amenities and signage.

The proposed works and initiatives are expected to cost \$122,850 and are not currently budgeted for. It is proposed to refer this budget request to the Q1 2026/27 budget forecast process.

Council officers will continue to engage with the local community, including with the Tate Reserve Working Group for 2026/27, which has been established as part of the conflict resolution process. This project continues to represent an important opportunity to better manage and ensure our open spaces remain safe, inclusive, and sustainable for all members of the Merri-bek community.

7.3 C236MBEK - GATEWAY 2 - DCP 2.0 CONSIDERATION OF SUBMISSIONS AND REQUEST FOR A PLANNING PANEL

Executive Summary

As Merri-bek grows, demand for new and upgraded roads, drainage and community facilities will increase. To ensure new development continues to contribute to this infrastructure need, Council has prepared a new 15-year Development Contributions Plan (DCP 2.0) to replace the previous plan, which expired earlier this year.

Planning Scheme Amendment C236mbek (the Amendment) proposes to introduce DCP 2.0 into the Merri-bek Planning Scheme by:

- Applying Schedule 2 to the Development Contributions Overlay (DCPO2) to all land within the municipality.
- Incorporating the *Development Contributions Plan* (Hill PDA, March 2026).

If approved, the Amendment will enable Council to continue collecting contributions from new development (DCP levy) to help fund essential infrastructure.

The Amendment was publicly exhibited for four weeks from 11 May to 17 June 2026. Four submissions were received, with the majority supporting the Amendment:

- The three supportive submissions welcomed the continuation of Merri-bek's development contributions program and recognised DCP 2.0 as an equitable mechanism to help fund essential infrastructure, including drainage upgrades.
- The one non-supportive submission raised concerns about the proposed transitional arrangements and the relationship between DCP 2.0 and the future Infrastructure Contributions Plan (ICP).

Officers have considered the submissions and issues raised and do not propose any changes to the Amendment. As such, this report recommends that Council endorses the Amendment as exhibited and request the Minister for Planning appoint an Independent Planning Panel to consider the Amendment and submissions received during exhibition.

7.4 SUBURB BOUNDARY REALIGNMENT COBURG NORTH/FAWKNER - BETWEEN SYDNEY ROAD AND MERRI-CREEK.

Executive Summary

Development activity has created the need for a minor realignment of the Fawkner/Coburg North suburb boundary to ensure affected properties are addressed consistently with their road access and the Naming Rules for Places in Victoria.

The proposal would transfer 90A and 92 Mathieson Street, 12 Manly Court, 14 Borang Street and 18 Albert Street from Fawkner to Coburg North, resolving current mapping and addressing inconsistencies arising from recent development.

The impacted properties currently have ongoing issues with mail and service deliveries. In addition, inconsistencies with Vicmap create a risk for emergency services if there is a need to attend the property promptly. Realigning the suburb boundary will address these issues.

Consultation with directly affected owners who responded indicated support for the change. While no objections were received, some adjacent owners requested a broader boundary shift to the centreline of Queens Parade. This option is inconsistent with the current boundary and would affect a further 63 properties without the same demonstrated need.

A targeted realignment is recommended as the most appropriate response, supporting accurate addressing, service delivery and compliance with State naming requirements while avoiding unnecessary changes to established suburb boundaries.

Officer Recommendation

That Council endorses the realignment of the Coburg North and Fawkner suburb boundary to encompass properties at 90A Mathieson Street, 92 Mathieson Street, 12 Manly Court, 14 Borang Street, and 18 Albert Street Fawkner, into Coburg North as outlined in this report.

7.8 CONTRACT AWARD: RFT-2026-10 - BALFE PARK, BRUNSWICK EAST - SPORTS GROUND UPGRADE WORKS

Executive Summary

This report seeks Council approval to award Contract RFT-2026-10 – Balfe Park, Brunswick East Sports Ground Upgrade to the preferred contractor Global Turf Projects Pty Ltd.

The Balfe Park Sports Ground Upgrade forms part of Council's commitment to improving sporting infrastructure across Merri-bek and supporting the increasing demand for quality outdoor recreation facilities. The project will deliver upgrades to the existing soccer field, including drainage, irrigation and field regrading works, to improve playing conditions, increase field availability and enhance the long-term performance of the facility for the Brunswick Zebras Football Club and the broader community.

Seven conforming tenders were received and assessed in accordance with Council's Procurement Policy against weighted evaluation criteria including cost, capability, capacity, methodology, program and sustainability considerations.

Following the tender evaluation process, Global Turf Projects Pty Ltd has been identified as the preferred contractor, who have a strong track record of completing comparable sports field upgrade projects for local government clients. The contract award results in a budget shortfall of approximately \$102,820 which will be referred to in the quarterly forecast process.

The procurement process complies with section 109(1) of the *Local Government Act 2020* and Council's Procurement Policy.
