



As you'll be reading this before the October Council elections, I want to take a quick moment to thank you for the opportunity to serve as Mayor over the past year.

It has been a privilege to represent our thriving Merri-bek community and I'm so proud of the work we've done together to help make our community even better.


Over the past year, we've made huge progress on the \$36.8 million Fawkner Leisure Centre redevelopment that's set to re-open this coming summer (read more on page 6), as well as the Saxon Street community arts hub. We've advocated to the Victorian Government to transform Sydney Road with accessible tram stops and protected bike lanes and we have created new parks and green spaces for everyone to enjoy.

We're progressing changes to our local roads to make them safer for everybody, whether you're walking, riding, rolling or driving. And this winter we've been planting more trees in our community to cool our neighbourhoods and provide shade and a home for wildlife.

I'm also proud of Council's advocacy, alongside First Nations community members and the Wurundjeri Woi-wurrung people, for the State Government to transfer ownership of the Ballerrt Mooroop site in Glenroy back to Traditional Custodians. You can read more about this on page 6.

Also, check out just some of the events, festivals and workshops happening in Merri-bek on the back page. The much-loved Coburg Night Market is on in December, with its free live music, local shopping and food trucks!

Thank you again for the opportunity to serve as Mayor this year. Following the October elections, the new Council will form in November, and the work continues.



Our 2024-28 budget, investing in community

Council recently adopted its final budget of this Council term.

The budget features big-ticket community infrastructure, including the completion of the \$36.9 million Fawkner Leisure Centre Stage 1 revamp and the new \$29.0 million Saxon Street Cultural and Community Hub.

The budget also allocates \$23.6 million to improving parks, open space and streetscapes and \$4.6 million for delivering footpaths, bike paths and transport infrastructure.

Some of the other key highlights of the budget in 2024-25 are:

- A capital-works program of \$92.7 million, to build new and improve existing community infrastructure and maintain community assets
- Investing in environmental sustainability, including providing grants to support low-income households to install insulation and solar panels at home.
- Roads and carparks renewal and maintenance (\$18.9 million)
- Delivering the final year of the Council Plan 2021-25.

Community Budget Ideas: Your Voice, Your Impact

Twelve-year-old Maxine recently sent in a submission to our Community Budget call out, requesting more drinking fountains to be installed in shopping strips across Merri-bek.

We are so excited to share that Maxine's submission was one of the successful submitted Community Budget Ideas selected for the 2024-25 Budget.

Thanks to Maxine's advocacy, we're investing \$60,000 towards installing drinking fountains in shopping strips, promoting hydration and convenience for all.

A dedicated Youth Connector, Maxine also actively shares council information among her peer groups and networks for feedback, also printing flyers to display on her high school noticeboard.

Championing not only young people in Merri-bek, but the broader community Maxine says:

"More drinking fountains across Merri-bek will mean fewer plastic water bottles, keeping waste off the street. The fountains will also provide a clean, free source for homeless people so no one in our community goes thirsty."

More on the Community Budget Ideas Program

Last year, we invited Merri-bek residents, community groups, sporting clubs, businesses, and organizations to suggest projects, initiatives, and programs that Council could include in the upcoming budget.

1220 people participated in Stage 2 engagement, with 415 supporting their three favourite projects online and 808 people doing the same in-person at 5 pop-up locations.

Thanks to your active participation and valuable input, we've allocated \$399,000 towards the Community Budget Ideas initiatives included in the budget.

Here's how your ideas have been incorporated:

- \$150,000 to accelerate the installation of sunshades over Merri-bek's playgrounds, ensuring safer and more enjoyable play spaces for children.
- \$40,000 towards installing more seats along walking routes to the shops, making it easier for everyone to take a break and rest.
- \$60,000 for installing drinking fountains in shopping strips.
- \$59,000 for the "Take the Next Step Merribek" domestic violence prevention program, addressing an important community need.
- \$60,000 for a half-court basketball ring in Glenroy, encouraging active lifestyles and community engagement.
- \$30,000 for a free basketball court and soccer field for all of Fawkner, providing inclusive recreational opportunities.

Your ideas have directly influenced these positive changes, demonstrating the power of community collaboration. Thank you for helping shape a brighter future for Merri-bek.

Love Sydney Road

Love Sydney Road is our new program to clean up and beautify an iconic part of Merri-bek - the Sydney Road shopping strip from Brunswick Road, Brunswick to Bell Street, Coburg.

We want it to be a great place for people to live, work, visit and enjoy.

You told us this section of Sydney Road needed some love and we've listened.

Through Love Sydney Road, we are:

- Street cleaning daily from Monday to Friday.
- Also cleaning public spaces of Victoria Street Mall,
 Dunnes Lane, Page Street, Coburg, and the Brunswick
 Mechanics Institute and Sparta Place, Brunswick
- Removing graffiti from public infrastructure and buildings.
- Supporting local traders through help with shopfront improvements and more.
- Creating two new murals as part of our RenuWall public art program.

This is along with continuing our daily street sweeping, and our rubbish collection services.

Sydney Road business owner, Dr David Cannon of Brunswick Chiropractic, knows the value of street beautification.

A mural painted on his building, commissioned by the Sydney Road Business Association, helps minimise graffiti and tagging.

"We've been very lucky so far to be on the receiving end of street beautification. Anything Council can do to improve the vibe of Sydney Road is a good thing for traders, residents and visitors," said Dr Cannon.

Love Sydney Road has been developed with community input, including feedback from local traders and through contributions to our Community Budget Ideas program.



Celebrating community and creativity in Fawkner

Fawkner Primary School students are embarking on a special artistic journey to create a site-specific clay artwork, to be unveiled at 2024 Fawkner Festa on Sunday, November 17.

The collaborative project celebrates the school's rich history and diverse community through research, reflection, and hands-on experimentation with ceramics and collage.

Renowned for their work in community arts, artists Ruth Hitchens and Hira Salman will mentor the students, guiding them to bring their creative visions to life.

This partnership not only introduces the students to the medium of clay but also offers an enriching experience in artistic expression and community engagement.

The artwork will be presented both at Fawkner Primary School and at the Fawkner Festa, celebrating the students' creativity and hard work.

A bright future for Fawkner Leisure Centre

Exciting changes are taking place at Fawkner Leisure Centre, one of Merri-bek City Council's 6 Aquatic and Leisure Centres.

With a significant \$36.6 million redevelopment underway, the centre will reopen for the 2024-25 summer season, promising a host of new and improved facilities that will cater to the diverse needs of the community.

Following extensive community consultation, we're excited to announce the latest significant milestones:

- Completion of the outdoor 50m and water-play pools
- Extension of the gym, new program space and group fitness studio
- Updated foyer, reception and café lounge area
- Near-completion of southern building structure
- New sauna, steam room and spa
- Significant landscaping progress

The redeveloped centre will be more accessible, and environmentally friendly and provide increased options for all ages and abilities to participate in a healthy and active lifestyle.

Discover the significance of Ballerrt Mooroop in Glenroy

The Ballerrt Mooroop site, located on the former Glenroy High School site, is a place of important cultural and historical significance for First Nations peoples.

That's why Council has been advocating for the State Government to give the Hilton Street site to the Wurundjeri Woi-wurrung Cultural Heritage Aboriginal Corporation to use for education and cultural purposes for both Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal communities in Merri-bek and Hume.

Initially transformed into the Koori Open Door Education (KODE) School and later known as Ballerrt Mooroop College, it has been a significant educational and cultural precinct for young Aboriginal people.

Ballerrt Mooroop means Strong Spirit in Woi-wurrung.

The site is currently owned by the State Government but is leased to the Wurundjeri Woi-wurrung Cultural Heritage Aboriginal Corporation.

Council has been working together with the Wurundjeri to transform the Ballerrt Mooroop site into a thriving community hub. We're proud to have received the Reconciliation Victoria Maggolee Award back in May for this work.

During the 2024 Reconciliation Week, we celebrated Ballerrt Mooroop Day on-site, with over 400 people attending. This event highlighted the community's recognition of the site's importance.

Uncle Charles Pakana, Victorian Aboriginal News Editor and Journalist, says Ballerrt Mooroop is an important site to bring the community together.

"From a reconciliation perspective, Ballerrt Mooroop stands strong within Victoria as a place that supports the coming together of Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal community members in the spirit of cultural respect, education and collaboration," he said.

All visitors are invited to respect and cherish Ballerrt Mooroop, a site of great cultural and historical significance.
